Welcome to the quarterly HeadsUp
Newsletter! Since our last newsletter,
Pennsylvania has experienced regional
fluctuations in COVID-19 cases, requiring
prompt and flexible responses to changing
situations. The PA First-Episode Psychosis
(FEP) Coordinated Specialty Care (CSC)
programs have continued to rise to the
challenge of providing care during this
transitional time through flexibility, creativity
and adaptability, frequently offering a hybrid
schedule of in-person and telehealth visits.

In this edition of our newsletter we are excited to feature ENGAGE Westmoreland, a newly OMHSAS-funded Pennsylvania FEP program of Wesley Family Services located in the town of New Kensington, PA. We are highlighting Marci Sturgeon-Rusiewicz, the Director of ENGAGE FEP Programs in Westmoreland and Allegheny Counties, and Melissa McKowen, the Team Leader of ENGAGE FEP Program Westmoreland County. ENGAGE Westmoreland is one of three newly funded programs starting in the summer of 2021, along with CHOP FEP (Children's Hospital of Philadelphia) and On My Way Northampton (Child and Family Focus, Inc.), which brings the number of PA FEP programs

To support our new and existing centers, our annual fall training program, which may include an in-person component based on the feedback we have received, will include training on core CSC components as well as new offerings developed with participants' input, conducted by experienced providers and trainers representing programs across the Commonwealth. Please stay tuned for more information this summer.

Despite new program additions, there are still large expanses of PA where FEP CSC care is not available. Last year, we launched our HeadsUp Early Psychosis Mentor program, a consultative service linking PA clinicians working with individuals experiencing early psychosis to a panel of experts in the field by calling 1-833-933-2816 or visiting https://www.headsup-pa.org/headsup-mentor. FEATURED CENTER

Established in 2021, ENGAGE Westmoreland is one of two ENGAGE programs serving the state of Pennsylvania. Located in the town of New Kensington, serving individuals in Westmoreland County between the ages of 15-30.

The ENGAGE program works to provide personalized treatment and attention to maintain client independence and autonomy, enhance quality of life in social and employment and educational settings, and provide support for families and caregivers. The ENGAGE Westmoreland team consists of: a psychiatrist, therapist, case manager, vocational/educational specialist and a certified peer specialist who work together to meet all needs of our participants with the goal of decreasing the duration of untreated psychosis to prevent a second psychotic episode through early intervention.

ENGAGE Westmoreland helps to educate the community about the importance of early intervention through our multidisciplinary coordinated specialty care team and the evidenced based practices that we rely upon.

EPINET UPDATES

Since fall 2020, our Pennsylvania First Episode Psychosis (FEP) sites have been collaborating with Maryland FEP sites in the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) funded Early Psychosis Intervention Network (EPINET) project. Led by Monica Calkins, PhD for Eastern PA sites and Deepak Sarpal, MD for Western PA sites, HeadsUp is now part of the Connection Learning Healthcare System (Connection LHS), an EPINET Regional Hub centered at the University of Maryland and led by Melanie Bennett, PhD. As an EPINET Regional Hub, Connection LHS uses data to improve early psychosis services and to promote a culture of collaborative learning and continuous quality improvement across 20+ programs delivering Coordinated Specialty Care (CSC) for youth and young adults experiencing early psychosis and their families.

NEWEST PUBLICATION

Early Intervention



In March, 2022 we published our most recent article in Early Intervention in Psychiatry,

"Development of empirically derived brief program evaluation measures in Pennsylvania first-episode psychosis coordinated specialty care programs." With the goal of reducing administrative time and maximizing clinical utility, we aimed to generate a short form using item response theory (IRT)-based computer-adaptive test (CAT) simulation and analyze the implementation and acceptability of the short form among providers from PA-CSC.

The empirical derivation and implementation of abbreviated measures of key domains and constructs in FEP care have streamlined and facilitated PA-FEP program evaluation. Our work supports potential application of IRT based methods to empirically reduce core assessment battery measures in large-scale data collection efforts such as in the Early Psychosis Intervention Network.
