



Recognizing and Responding to Emerging Psychosis in Adolescents and Young Adults

Workshop Description:

Recognizing and Responding to Early Psychosis for Community Health Providers offers a full day workshop focusing on an intensive introduction, overview and practice of psychosis identification, management and referral to evidencebased care. It offers community mental, behavioral, and physical health workers a deep dive into assessment and practice of crisis and suicide for individuals experiencing psychosis as well as an overview of the current psychopharmacological treatments regarding symptoms, co-occurring substance use and social determinants of health.

There will be no cost to attend - sessions are funded through the Community Mental Health Services Block Grant (CFDA# 93.958) from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), received through the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (OMHSAS).

Workshop Learning Objectives:

- 1. Recognize and be able to screen for early signs and symptoms of psychosis
- 2. Describe how to connect to local specialized treatment resources for individuals experiencing early psychosis
- 3. Discuss the difference between suicide assessment and screening
- 4. Identify and develop a plan to implement crisis de-escalation technique
- 5. Recognize possible side effects to treatment that may be medication related
