HeadsUp Clinical Care in First Episode Psychosis (FEP) Grand Rounds 2024







Series Description:

The HeadsUp Clinical Care in First Episode Psychosis (FEP) Grand Rounds 2024 offers an intensive (up to 160-hours) dive into applicable, recovery-centered education for individuals involved in early psychosis care. Led by experts in the field, sessions will cover childhood through young adulthood and will include tools for early detection, diagnosis, treatment best practices, and post-treatment management. Varying sessions will be held virtually twice per month via Penn Zoom over the course of 7 months via a grand-rounds format from April to October 2024.

Series Learning Objectives:

- 1. Identify diagnostic criteria for psychosis spectrum disorders compared to other mental health disorders
- 2. Identify and support individuals experiencing early psychosis through varied educational and employment accommodations
- 3. Identify psychopharmacological and clinical treatment modalities for individuals experiencing early psychosis symptoms based on age and symptomatology
- 4. Name and locate key referral options for individuals experiencing early psychosis symptoms based on age and geographic location

There will be no cost to attend - sessions are funded through the Community Mental Health Services Block Grant (CFDA# 93.958) from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), received through the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (OMHSAS).
